The Texas Dispute Resolution Process Provides More Due Process Protections for Patients than 22 Other States that Also Allow Safe Harbor for Physicians

The dispute resolution process in Texas law (§ 166.046, Health & Safety Code) compares very well with other states' dispute resolutions laws. These twenty-two states provide safe harbor for physicians as does Texas, but Texas provides more due process to protect patients' end of life decision-making autonomy.
